Your long-serving Ghillie Callum Editor Carol McOwen has decided to step down, beginning with this issue.

Carol contributed to the newsletter even before she became editor about 1994. During her tenure as editor, she oversaw the transition into the digital age, always updating her computer and its programs, and improving her computer skills to bring the LA Branch the best possible newsletter.

Many of you may never have met Carol, as problems with shoulders, hips, etc. have kept her off the dance floor in recent years. Carol credits her son for first making her aware of Scottish Country Dancing, which he discovered as a grad student at UC Berkeley. He's Robert McOwen, an SCD teacher in Boston and renowned Highland dancer. His wife is fiddler Barbara

After Miss Milligan called from RSCDS Headquarters to inform that Los Angeles had been granted Branch status, David Brandon, the first elected chairman, contacted the Thistle Band to provide the first live music to celebrate the occasion. The first dance was held at Hollenbeck High School in East L.A. with Pete Kier providing the sound equipment he used for his Dixieland band.

C. Stewart Smith, a Scottish immigrant to San Francisco, had trained the first L.A. Branch teachers. He heard of the event and helped David and the band plan the first workshop weekend at the historic Mission Inn in Riverside. Many dancers came from San Francisco because Stewart told his dancers about the joy of dancing to live music. Stewart taught the popular and exciting dance 1314 at this workshop.
