"AULD LANG SYNE"

The nostalgic phrase "auld lang syne" appeared in Scottish song as early as 1588, but it was the poet Robert Burns who gave us the version we sing every Dec. 31.

When Burns turned in the manuscript of "Auld Lang Syne" in 1788 he was quick to cite it as "an old song of the old times." He is said to have explained, "It has never been in print, nor even in a manuscript until I took it down from an old man." In his interpretation, Burns added the phrase: "we'll take a cup of kindness yet, for auld lang syne ..."

A MYSTERY

Mary Isdale McNab published notes for a 200-bar set dance titled The Earl of Errol's Reel, and there's quite a story about one earl. The title of Earl of Erroll was granted in 1452, but it was a later earl who was the center of a murder mystery in January 1941.

That Earl of Errol, Josslyn Hay, lived in Kenya's Happy Valley, a community of British ex-patriots notorious for drug use, drinking and adultery.

In the early morning of Jan. 24, 1941, the earl was found dead in his car. The suspect was Sir Jock Delves Broughton, with whose wife the earl had been having an affair. Sir Jock was tried for the murder and, although found not guilty, he later committed suicide.

A VERY FAMILY VACATION

Sometimes you find out the most interesting things about your family. When I was still a little girl of not quite 9 years old, my future father-in-law, Larry Hansen, died in New York. He was born in 1891 in Denmark and was placed in foster care from birth. An old widow, to make some money, took in this infant. She had family with whom she often visited, so the baby grew up with other children. Apparently, he was a nice person, for the extended foster family loved him and he stayed in contact with them until the 1930s.

In 1915 he left for the Danish West Indies (the Virgin Islands), and when the islands were bought by the U.S. in 1917, he moved to New York and became an American citizen. He never visited Denmark again.

Larry died in 1944, but his son Alvin, who became my husband, lived on for many years only knowing part of his father's story.

The adult grandchildren of that old widow had letters, photos and paintings by Larry that he had sent back to Denmark, things we didn't know about. We did not have any contact information but they were persistent and through serious research found us.

This summer my daughter Lisbeth met

them for the first time and she was able to bring back with her paintings from the Virgin Islands done by her grandfather in 1915-17.

This photo is from Himmelbjerget, the sky mountain (remember Denmark is quite flat), looking out over the Silkeborg lakes. It was thought to be the highest point in Denmark for years but now they think there is another hill slightly higher. It is Lisbeth to the left, me in the middle and then Jenny. (The light blue clothing was a coincidence for the day. We had a good laugh when we met for breakfast.)


CLASSES

DANCING ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The Society has a program called the Dancing Achievement Award (DAA) designed to help you improve your technique and knowledge of SCD. The DAA has three levels of achievement: intermediate, advanced and very advanced.
