


then dancing, drink and song!"


My muscles too, it seemed to me,

## AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND TOURS

Christine Grobler of the Orange County Branch has led four successful dancing tours of New Zealand and is now ready for Australia. She would love to take dancing friends through the gum tree-lined highways to meet the Aussies. The tour theme is primarily dancing and sightseeing. Each tour is customized as far as choices on what to see and do.

Approximate dates for the 2015 tour are March 28 to April 12. The tour will start in Sydney and end in Hobart. Stops will include the Blue Mountains, Bundanoon Scottish Festival, Canberra, Melbourne and Tasmania, with dancing at four or five RSCDS clubs throughout Australia.

Ground transportation will be in a comfortable 12-seat van. Other activities may include cultural entertainment, city and botanical tours, hiking and sightseeing. Both dancers and non-dancers are welcome.

The 2014 New Zealand tour is approximately Sept. 29 to Oct. 12. Using a van for six to eight passengers, the tour will take in both the North and South islands. Tour members will stay and dance with local RSCDS Clubs in Auckland, Rotorua and Christchurch. They will also see Queenstown and Fox Glacier and have the experience of staying on a sheep farm.

Sarah met her husband Doug through a mutual friend, and in 1978 they moved to Santa Barbara so he could attend the Brooks Institute of Photography. Doug retired in December 2013 after 32 years of providing video and media support to the scientific, engineering, leadership and management teams of Santa Barbara Research Center and then Raytheon Vision Systems.

Sarah worked as a registered dental assistant for 10 years and then for the Sansum Clinic in the Patient Service Department and Managed Care area for 21 years. Currently she is working in the reservation department at Lo-
