We're going to Light the Candles on the Birthday Cake!

Greetings everyone ~ it's our birthday and we are going to celebrate. But first, I would like to take a short trip down the memory lane of the Los Angeles Branch.

In the past forty years a lot of changes and events have taken place. In that time the U.S. has had 8 Presidents – but Britain only one queen. Calvin Coolidge was President when the Society was formed in 1923, and Lyndon B. Johnson was president in 1966 when the LA Branch was formed. We have walked on the moon~ we found the Titanic. We've searched for Nessie, stalked Big Foot and pretty much given up on the Himalayan Yeti. We've seen skirts go up and hair go down; we've seen skirts go down and hair go up.

The same has happened with SCD in Los Angeles. Lots of changes. In the early days when we held our monthly parties in Miles Playhouse, we did have cue books for the dances, but we didn't have the glorious wall posters that we have now, we had a "crib board" on which the names of the dances were displayed, reminiscent of the "hymn boards" in church, and during the intervals, someone would come along and take out the old dances and insert the new ones.

We danced to music on long-playing records – having always to be careful not to dance too close to the player otherwise the needle would skip. We ladies were not yet emancipated enough to boldly ask a gentleman to dance except for the dances marked with an asterisk - these were the designated "ladies choice" dances for the evening; the program devisors were careful to evenly distribute the choices, I might add, so that we ladies had a choice of asking the gentleman of our choice for a reel, jig or strathspey.

Then came the advent of live music when Jack Rennie formed the Thistle Band. The LA Branch proudly hailed the Thistle Band as their very own, although it didn't take long for their fame to spread and soon they were playing up and down the West Coast for every dance event. They were the perennial musicians for the Banff Springs Weekend and many of the Los Angeles dancers have fond memories of those glorious weekends. Banff Springs was the premier dance event in the whole of Western North America!

In the early '70s a new and, at that time, radical change took place at our dances -- we began to brief the dances. People no longer needed to bury



their noses in their cue books, instead a brave-hearted teacher would “talk” the dances through. Another subtle change took place – we women demanded our rights and “ladies choice” dances became a thing of the past. It was equality for all.

Awareness of the fact that the strength of the Branch lies in encouraging new dancers, we began having several dances in the year which were labeled “Beginner Dance”. Again in an effort to encourage new dancers, we had “Dollar/Dish” dances – meaning the admittance was \$1 and you had to bring a dish.

There have been subtle changes in the classes too; in the early days never, ever would a lady come to class in pants. Then, when pants were becoming so much more a part of everyday dress, I have very clear memories of having to take a dancer or two aside and ask that they wear a skirt to class. I think I even suggested that if they didn’t have a skirt, they could get one very cheaply at a thrift store!

However, in all change there is at least one constant – and our constant is the sheer enjoyment we get from Scottish Country Dancing. I hope you have all marked your calendars with big red letters for April 29, 2006 ~ it certainly is a red-letter day for the Los Angeles Branch. It is going to be a truly magical evening. Enclosed in the Ghillie Callum is a flyer for the anniversary ball, so won’t you please tear off the bottom portion and reserve your tickets for what is going to be a genuinely memorable evening.

FLOWERS OF THE FOREST



1915-2005: Sadly, just before Christmas, after a lengthy illness, ADOLPHUS MORRIS, affectionately called "Dolph" by his friends, passed away at his home in Altadena. He was interred at Mountain View in Pasadena. It was followed by a traditional jazz reception held in the adjacent reception hall on December 22nd. Dolph was known as "the rhythm man" in the Dixieland music circles and in the Pasadena symphony group. He came to love Scottish country dance music when he joined the Thistle Dance Band in which he performed for some 25 years and traveled around extensively playing throughout the USA and Canada. He once played at the White House for the President as a member of "The Legends of Jazz" He is honored also by the RSCDS in Book 39 with the selection of "Mr. Dolph Morris Strathspey" being chosen as the tune for the dance Capetown Wedding. Many earlier members of the branch are familiar with his wife Juanita, who often attended our functions when he was playing. At 89, she survives him, as does his daughter, Jackie.

Shortly after the last issue of the Ghillie Callum we learned of the passing of JOHN TIFFANY, one of the first teachers to get a full-certificate by the Society in Southern California. Miss Milligan visited Los Angeles to examine teacher candidates trained by C. Stewart Smith with the objective of forming a branch of the Society. To become a branch, we had to have two full-certificate teachers, and John, along with David Brandon, passed the tests and the branch was formed a short time later. All of those attempting the tests were members of the Los Angeles Folk Dancers, who did some Scottish dancing along with other international folk dancing. John's main interest was folk dancing which he also taught. However, he did teach for the branch in a church in Inglewood. He is survived by his first wife, Susan, who was a former member of early demonstration teams= with John. There is also his son, Michael, of Ventura and a daughter on the east coast. The branch extends condolences to the family.


