

IN MEMORIAM

A memorial service was held July 7 in Culver City for Cathey Lawlor, the first woman to chair the Los Angeles Branch of the RSCDS.

Cathey, 73, grew up in Beverly Hills and lived many years in Culver City before moving to Porterville, where she died on May 21.

She began Scottish Country Dancing in about 1980 and was a member of Jack Rennie's Miles Playhouse class in Santa Monica. She also attended other classes, workshops and special events.
