## TREASURER'S REPORT

Summary of the Treasurer's Report for fiscal year ended June 30, 2022:

The Los Angeles Branch ended the year with assets of \$22,980, made up of \$22,778 in checking accounts and \$202 in prepaid hall rental fees. We had a liability of \$2,490 for dues paid in advance and designated funds of \$6,138.

Our net loss for the 2021/2022 fiscal year was \$2,367. This was primarily due to donations totaling \$500 to HQ and TAC as well as a 50% reduction in membership fees as a thank you to members for supporting us through COVID. ## 1923 — WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

At the April dance I wore a shirt emblazoned with the number "1923."

Very few people commented on it and only one person guessed the significance of the date. "1923" means that in 2023 the Society will be 100 years old.

Mrs. Ysobel Stewart, Girl Guide commissioner for Argyll, believed that Scottish girls should learn Scottish country dances. She wrote down notes for the dances she remembered from her youth.

Mrs. Stewart and Miss Jean Milligan, a teacher at Jordonhill College, together arranged a meeting on Nov. 26, 1923; 27 interested people met in Glasgow to form the Scottish Country Dance Society. Mrs. Stewart emigrated from Scotland the following year, leaving Miss Milligan to guide the society for its first 50 years.

In 1951, King George VI added "Royal" to the organization's name, and HRH Princess Elizabeth became the patron.

The society has already put some celebratory plans in place. Sept. 30, 2023, will be another World Day of Dance. Ten dances have been selected (one from each decade) with the hope that they will be danced in each branch at

an appropriate time. Thus, there will be dancing somewhere in the world over 24 hours.

## OBITUARY

### Gilbert Gotfried

January 26, 1925 — July 25, 2022

Gilbert Gotfried, long known to us locally as “Gil,” passed away on July 25 at age 97. He was born and raised in Brooklyn, NY, and attended Brooklyn College, where he met his wife Rosalind, known to us as “Roz.” He taught mathematics at Brooklyn’s Wingate High School, where he became department chairman.



Gil served in the United States Army during World War II and was among those who liberated Valkenburg aan de Geul in the southeast “tail” of the Netherlands on Sept. 17, 1944, after its more than four years of occupation. He is still personally remembered there, and his obituary appeared in the Limburg provincial newspaper.

Gil and Roz began Scottish country dancing back in 1992 while still in Brooklyn and then continued after they moved to California. Gil had not been physically able to dance in the most recent years, but he and Roz were “fixtures” of the Los Angeles Branch for many years. Their wonderful SCD legacy is their daughter Roberta, one of our branch teachers.
